

# What is the Exploratory Center?

The University of Georgia created the Exploratory Center in 2016 to provide academic advising services to exploring and undecided students. Students who aren't completely sure of their major, who feel they may be in the wrong major, who hope to find a major that pairs well with their pre-professional goals, or who simply want to know more about the 130+ majors offered at UGA are welcome to be advised in the EC. We want all students to know that it is OK to be undecided! We provide guided exploration of academic options while advising students for degree completion.

The Exploratory Center also advises students who plan to apply to Grady College of Journalism and Mass Communications or Terry College of Business. # What does it mean to be an Undecided (Exploring) major?

Being undecided simply means you want the freedom to explore all of the major options available to you while still completing the requirements for an undergraduate degree. Here in the Exploratory Center, we help students discover their interests, skills, values, and goals while working through the major declaration process.

Once you have been accepted as a UGA student, there are two ways to connect with an Explore advisor:

#### How will my credits transfer to UGA?

## What if my courses don't show up on this equivalency site?

Many courses have not yet been evaluated for equivalency at UGA. An advisor will be able to help you request a new course evaluation from the appropriate department once you have been accepted to UGA. Outside of this search system, there will be no guarantee of course equivalency before your transcripts are posted here at UGA, and you have confirmed your acceptance.

## Can I graduate "on time" if I don't declare a major right away?

Exploring various majors is definitely a shorter process for transfer students who have already completed part or all of their core requirements. Our advisors have knowledge of all UGA majors and are trained to help students determine how their current courses stand up to the requirements of various majors and programs. They can suggest specific course options that will work for the majors you are considering, discuss application processes for various programs that require applications, and help connect you to the colleges or departments you will need to speak to for any UGA major you might be interested in.

### I'm not sure my major will enable me to get a "good job" .... What should I do?

Most employers are looking for employees who have critical thinking skills, oral and written communication skills, problem-solving skills, the ability to work cooperatively in a group, and the ability to be innovative and creative. Students can gain these skills through any major at UGA. We also partner with an excellent Career Center that can connect you with resources to aid you in your job search; including internships, access to job search sites, mock interviews, and workshops for writing resumes and cover letters.

#### What should I major in if I want to pursue a medical profession?

### What should I major in if I plan to apply to law school?

Unlike medical schools, there are no prerequisite classes for law school. However, applicants to law school must take the LSAT, which evaluates students' critical reading, verbal reasoning, and analytical thinking skills. If you are pre-law, you should choose a major that will foster those skills and that you can be happy with even if you eventually change your mind about law school. UGA's Pre-Professional Advising Office can also help students in their preparation for law school applications.
